United States History

Course Description: This course is a survey of United States history; it is an interdisciplinary and multicultural study of the evolution of U.S. history, culture, and society from the British colonies through the Era of Social Change. The class will integrate literature from the various time periods in order to further enhance the curriculum. This course is a chronological and thematic survey of our nation's past, with emphasis placed on 20th century America, special emphasis is placed on historical cause and effect and events, movements, and people who have established/impacted the American past. The course promotes an appreciation and awareness of the richness of our history and institutions.

Policies: All MTCHS policies and procedures will be followed for attendance, absent, or late work.

Expectations and Procedures:

- 1. Make-up work--Check moodle, talk to another student or see me outside of class time. Do not ask me what we did two minutes before class. Schedule a time to meet with me if you need assistance. In order to teach responsibility students must contact the teacher when they will be gone to see what they need to make up. If a student is absent the day of a test, presentation, or project, it is up to them to speak with the teacher to find out how to make up the required work.
- 2. Any work submitted beyond **THREE** days will not be accepted, unless prior arrangements were made between the student and teacher. Some projects may not be turned in late per teacher discretion.
- 3. You will need to take notes and participate in class discussions. I have high expectations for you and in order for you to succeed and to enjoy our time together you need to be present and accountable for the information.
- 4. No cell phones. I will not budge on this. If there is an opportunity for personal devices I will let you know, otherwise you don't bring them out in our classroom. If I see them you will get one warning, the second time it will go on my desk, and the third you will be directed to the office. If you have an emergency, let me know and we will work something out.
- **5.** I have a zero tolerance rule about gaming within my classroom.
